Message from the CEO

In recent weeks, I have met with staff from several parts of our business to understand how the 2015/16 Business Plan is being implemented on the ground. On my visits, I have seen a mix of reactions ranging from an *outright commitment to actively participate in the future of KCM* to a passive *let's wait and see* approach. The turnaround of our business and the re-establishing of KCM as a leader in the industry will be a long and hard journey, which requires commitment from each and every one of you, so please be an active participant.

SAFETY

In the past year, we have worked hard, all together, to ensure that Safety at KCM is not just a slogan. Our hardwork and commitment to the Chachilamo campaign is now delivering benefits and an improving safety performance. Lost Time Injuries (LTIs) have reduced in the last 12 months from around three every month, down to around one per month. In May, we recorded zero LTIs and, so far in June, we are at zero again. This is good news but remember that our aim is for Zero Harm all the time.

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Production Performance

KCM's results for the 2014/2015 financial year were released on 14 May, 2015. The results indicated a large financial loss even after we achieved integrated production of 116,000 tonnes of copper. The main reason for the loss was that we missed all of our production targets and only achieved 70% of the plan. We urgently need to change this continued under-performance and return KCM to a profit making business through higher production levels and higher productivity. In addition, it is our collective responsibility to keep finding ways to cut our cost of production, through more efficient spending and through the elimination of waste.

Konkola Business Unit

Improvements have been recorded at Konkola. The phase I rehabilitation of Shaft No. 1 was completed in March and phase II is expected to be completed by November. At No. 4 shaft, we are now using the bottom-shaft loading facility after repairs and rehabilitation. Mid-shaft loading repairs will be completed by December. After copper in concentrate production declined to 3,100 tonnes in February, production rose to 4,100 tonnes in April – the highest level in 18 months. All employees received a one-off bonus of 25Kg bag of mealie meal for their efforts. Management will continue to reward outstanding employees.

At the end of May, Konkola was at 77% of Plan so we now want to see this average move up rapidly and for the business to deliver on its catch-up plan.

Nchanga Business Unit

There have been many challenges at Nchanga, including flooding during the recent nationwide power outage, and transformer breakdowns at the TLP. Overall NIBU copper in concentrate production was 1,300 tonnes in April, down from 1,757 tonnes in March. Since then, Cut II production has markedly improved where employees received a full production bonus in April – the first time in 10 months. Well done to Cross Silwamba and team! We now want to see the same improvements at NUG.

At the end of May, Nchanga copper in concentrate was at 74% of Plan with TLP topping the performance at 93% of Plan. Well done Rajendra and team!

Security Issues

Thieves continue to operate at KCM and I request you to be highly vigilant to protect our copper and our assets. Recently, a 500-metre cable supplying power to the concentrator and crusher was stolen, halting production and compromising the safety of our colleagues. All employees must be alert and report any suspected criminal activities to the Security Department, to my office, or to an immediate supervisor. Culprits will face the full force of the law.

Global Market Dynamics And Tax Issues

Despite some improvements in global market dynamics and recent increases in the price of copper, the metals market remains volatile, and today we are seeing prices down again. The bottom line is that we must raise production to sustain our operations. The government has decided to repay VAT refunds, but the refunds are yet to be received. KCM will continue to engage respectfully with government to find solutions.

Conclusion

As we continue to make progress in various aspects of the business, we must not stop coming up with new ideas – together, we can build a safer, more productive KCM with a bright future. We should continue to think outside the box on improvement measures and raise the levels of team spirit.

Konkola mine TSS performance is world class

Konkola Mine in Chililabombwe has successfully implemented major projects to reduce Total Suspended Solids (TSS) in the water pumped from underground and discharged into the Kafue River. The interventions have resulted in a downward trend in the TSS from around 100 parts per million in 2011 to 40 parts per million in 2015.

Environmental Coordinator, Mwila Chitoloma, said the company has refurbished the existing underground water sumps and settlers and replaced obsolete launders and pipes to make the settlers. This has created efficiency in the management of industrial waste and in maintaining lower levels of total suspended solids.

KCM has also installed new slurry pumps to reduce manual de-sludging period from over eight months to barely three weeks by using slurry pumps for one settler.

The refurbishment will minimize the cost of water treatment by the water utility company and minimize the impact on the environment.

"KCM is conserving the environment by preventing solids deposition in surrounding streams and rivers," he said.

Statutory regulations being implemented by the Zambia Environmental Management Agency (ZEMA) recommends TSS concentration at 100mg/l or 100ppm. The World Bank standard is 50ppm, while KCM benchmarks at 80ppm.

"The KCM limit of TSS is 80ppm and right now we are around 40ppm," he said.

Mr Chitoloma also said the environmental team has embarked on a programme to sensitise employees on hydro-carbon management to prevent spillages and leakages of fuels into the ground.

Meanwhile, Nkana Refinery has reaffirmed its commitment to upholding best environmental management practices and recently implemented an environmental project to capture, treat and re-use waste water from the operations.

Environmental Coordinator Kabwe Katongo said the plant will remain committed to protecting the environment through sustainable operations.

Mr Katongo said the environmental initiative was aimed at controlling surface water pollution by means of collecting and treating the cathode washings as well as any acidic or electrolyte spillage to meet the statutory limits prescribed under the Environmental Management Act No.12 of 2011.

The initiative has resulted in a reduction in fresh water consumption from an average 45,000M³/month to less than 20,000M³/month. The initiative has resulted in zero effluent discharge to the environment since April 2014.

Nchanga Open Pit (NOP) Cut II scaled up production in the first quarter beating monthly targets by over 100 percent in April and May.

Mr. Gubula Siaciti, Manager Planning and Technical Services at NOP said higher production was due to the acquisition of new equipment that was used to access locked-up ore on the footwall.

"KCM's acquisition of a 15 m³ 6030 Caterpillar hydraulic excavator last year aided in reducing the waste backlog on the footwall slope hence exposing the locked up ore. Currently we are mining the exposed ore and we plan to do so until the end of this financial year," Mr Siaciti said.

He said the copper being mined has got better grade and better

recoveries in the concentrator.

In April, production performance was above target, with 133 percent contained copper in ore mined against the budget plan. A total of 153,403 tonnes of copper ore was delivered to the mill against a budget of 150,402 tonnes.

"In May, the trend was the same, with production above target. We achieved 125%

contained copper in ore mined, and the total ore mined was 189,430 tonnes against a budget of 175,703 tonnes. The grade was at 0.90 percent against a budget of 0.78 percent," Mr Siaciti noted.

He attributed the success to team work and a sense of ownership, which has been incorporated in all the departments to ensure ore is delivered safely, according to plans.

Namibia to benchmark with KCM on CSR projects

Namibian High Commissioner to Zambia Leonard Nambahu says his country will seek to benchmark Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) programmes with KCM's community interventions.

Speaking in an interview in Chingola after touring KCM facilities, Mr Nambahu said he would ensure the KCM sustainable livelihood project was replicated in Namibia's mining firms and other corporate companies.

Mr Nambahu said he would arrange a visit by officials from Namibia to KCM to enable them to benchmark with the structured KCM community projects.

Mr Nambahu was impressed to learn that KCM has sent students to University of Namibia to study medicine and said over 170 Namibian students were currently studying at the University of Zambia.

He said Zambia and Namibia largely depend on the mining sector for revenue and economic growth.

"The more we do mining, the more we will get good returns and complement budgetary allocations of our two countries," he said.

The High Commissioner said Namibia and Zambia are working on strengthening intra trade relations.

"We need to create an environment where we can trade

Konkola Mine draws roadmap to unlock production potential

Konkola Business Unit (KBU) has created a 10-point plan to raise production by 50% for the current financial year compared to the previous year, Vice President Keith Kapui has said.

Mr Kapui said his team had drawn a strategy with key interventions to remove bottlenecks and unlock the production potential for Konkola mine, which is KCM's main lifeline. The downward trend in global metals prices, production losses and high power costs, had prompted the KBU team to seek ways to fulfill their production targets.

All supervisors and management staff have been mandated to take ownership of some projects to ensure accountability.

"It's really a matter of ensuring we improve production, manage costs to break-even and achieve the turnaround at Konkola," Mr Kapui said.

He said Konkola Shaft No. 1, which was taken out for debottlenecking in 2014 following an accident, has resumed normal hoisting of copper ore and waste. The No. 2 Shaft is operating for only 12 hours for rock hoisting and man handling, while the other 12 hours is being utilized for routine maintenance to ensure sustained operations.

Mr Kapui said Konkola is in the process of installing remote control units on mobile equipment to help increase extraction of broken ore from 65% to 80%. KBU is also looking at increasing

availability of equipment from 60% to 70%, after conducting an internal audit on equipment and machinery availability.

He said the team has also implemented the productivity improvements plans to ensure efficiency, enforce cage discipline and provide underground transport for critical workforce on time.

Critical development of Konkola East to improve ventilation and catch-up stope availability, as well as improving secondary development on 1065 Secondary development to bring in 1640m stope, which will commence production in June 2017, are on course.

Konkola is also undertaking

measures to realign employees to the business objectives.

"We want to inculcate identification of risks, fall of ground, correction of ground support installations to standards and reinforce the zero harm approach in the aftermath of the Chachilamo safety campaign," he said.

Mr Kapui expects the 10 projects to boost production and supplement output from other operations.

Mr Kapui described Konkola as the future of KCM. And added that, "we need to achieve our targets safely and make KCM profitable for the benefit of the current and future generations."

Likonge is the Head of Energy Management at Konkola mine in Chililabombwe. She also manages the strategic power plant unit, which serves as an emergency power plant, and KCM's motor repair shop sections – with a staff compliment of 17 under her supervision.

After returning to KCM, Likonge was appointed Head Engineer for Energy Management for the Konkola Business Unit (KBU).

Her passion is to help formulate initiatives that will enable Zambia to provide sustainable power supply for households and industry.

Benjamin Miti, Electrical Resident Superintendent at KIBU, describes Likonge as "a hardworking and innovative engineer."

In over 9 years in the mining industry, Likonge has designed and implemented the Power Reliability Project (PRP) for the Konkola Business Unit, where power supply is critical. Konkola is the world's

wettest mine. It pumps out an average 350,000 cubic meters of water per day.

The PRP is a project designed to provide reliable power supply to the mine when there is an interruption of supply from the national grid. The main objective of the project was to replace oil circuit breakers with vacuum circuit breakers for 15 11kv and 3.3kv substations.

Support projects were also identified and implemented, including the procurement, supply, installation, testing and

commissioning of 16 off HT motors, 4 off Capacitors, and the rehabilitation and revamping of a special tool room with various tools and instruments and facilities for staff training.

IMPACTING THE YOUNGER GENERATION

Likonge was also in charge of KCM's 24 megawatt diesel generator plant project from its inception. She conducted the scope of work, land survey, procurement and installations for its setup.

She explains, "this is the power plant that saved the day during the recent nationwide power outages." The plant ran for a prolonged period of 10 hours for the first time on the 27th and 28th of April following a nationwide power outage.

"I did not only initiate and implement the project, but I am successfully running it."

Likonge has executed critical projects for the mine at reduced costs, with an unbroken safety record and operational running hours

She is currently championing a project to save power costs without affecting production, mainly focusing on compressors, pumps, ventilation, the winder, and the concentrator. The project has led to a reduction in energy consumption from an average of 65,000MWhr/month to 58,000Mwhr/month and a reduction in maximum demand from 95 megawatts to 82 megawatts for the Konkola unit.

She looks forward to inspiring young Zambians to study in the field of engineering.

"I want to be a role model to the younger generation who wish to pursue a career in any engineering field," she said.

Outside work, Likonge enjoys jogging and gardening, and also spends time working with rural communities without access to power supply. She helps them to access power through a project supported by IEEE CSI/Smart Village.

She currently is a director of LICHI's Community Solutions Ltd and a member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE), Engineering Institute of Zambia (EIZ), Energy Regulation Board (ERB), Women in Power (WiP), Community Solution Initiatives (CSI)/ Smart Village and RenPEACE.



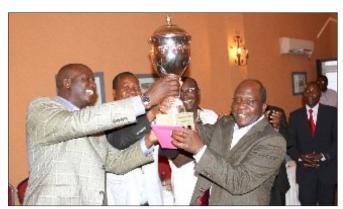

Chililabombwe adults to sit for their first-ever Grade 7 Exams

More than 100 adults will take their first-ever examinations after enrolling to write 2015 primary education examinations, courtesy of an adult literacy programme financed by Konkola Copper Mines (KCM).

Christina Chishala, a 63 year old

market trader at Mine Market in Chililabombwe, is enthusiastic about the benefits she is reaping in her business after learning how to read and write.

"Since I started the lessons last year, I have learned so much that my business has improved because I now give the correct change to customers. I have gained a lot of knowledge and have enrolled to write my grade seven examinations this year," Ms Chishala said.

Anna Chola, 56, another market trader said she was encouraged to join the classes after watching a foreign movie in which adults were conversing in English.

According to KCM Community Relations Manager Brian Siatubi, the programme has exceeded initial expectations.

"It is good that the Ministry of Education has allowed the learners to sit for grade seven exams. There is a glimmer of hope for those who never had a chance to attain this level of education."
