I am pleased to report that on the production side, despite the challenges presented by the power shortages, our production plan is on track and I see a marked improvement in the reliability of our plant and equipment. An excellent example of systematic improvement to enhance reliability has been achieved at the Leach Plant. Well done to the TLP Team!

As we close 2015, I want all of you to know that I am proud to be working with you. In my short time at KCM, I have experienced your warmth and the professionalism with which you carry out your duties. We are well on our way to setting up KCM as the best company in Zambia, thanks to you.

The gigantic Shaft No.4 faced down on a sizeable crowd of miners as Zambia's national colours and the KCM emblem winced into different patterns to conform to the direction of the winds at the shaft bank.

In no time, His Excellency President Edgar Chagwa Lungu walked on the red carpet, accompanied by the First Lady Esther Lungu and Chief Executive Officer Steven Din.

The mood of optimism expressed by the President was enough to lift many souls.

Mwamba Chitungulu, Chief Inspector for Administration Security at the Konkola Business Unit, identified strongly with the Presidential call for perseverance in order to protect KCM.

"In as much as we are facing tough times, we have to preserve our mines. If it means making hard decisions, we just have to make the hard decisions," he remarked.

Chembo Kasempa, a Management Trainee at the Konkola Business Unit appreciated the clarity of Mr Lungu's message.

"The information has been sound and clear. We are looking forward to the betterment of our company, we are hoping for the best" she said.

KCM 50-year vision key for growth - President Lungu

President Edgar Lungu says KCM's 50-year vision for mining in Zambia will enable the company to grow and achieve success.

Mr Lungu said the company's long term plan is in line with the government's focus for economic growth.

President Lungu said during a familiarization tour of the Konkola mine in October that forward planning was critical in mining, which remains the country's economic lifeblood and key driver for economic diversification.

KCM and its parent company, Vedanta Resources Plc, have a 50-year vision to continue mining in Zambia. The vision is a build-up on the \$3 billion investment in KCM in over a decade since Vedanta took a majority shareholding in the company.

Mr Lungu was impressed by KCM's long term planning after a brief from Chief Executive Officer Steven Din.

"I am happy that KCM has a 50year vision. This is exactly what my government is doing, to have a long-term vision for the country," Mr Lungu said.

Mr Lungu said past mistakes in economic planning were currently hurting the economy. The government was now eager to correct previous mistakes through forward planning and dialogue with various stakeholders.

The president said the government would support KCM

and other mining companies to overcome the current global economic challenges, caused mainly by low copper prices.

He said the dampened global prospects and a deficit of electricity in the country would be overcome through combined efforts by the government, industry and trade unions.

"The situation in the mining industry is very serious, but as Government we want to do our best to resolve these problems," he said. "Don't despair, copper prices may rise again and more jobs will be created in future. We just need to work hard. You cannot change the price of copper, the markets determine the price."

Mr Lungu extolled KCM for showing solidarity with the country and seeking to be part of resolving the country's problems during difficult times.

Mr Lungu said government policies would be tailored to address concerns by industry, the workforce and to ensure Zambians continued to benefit from their mineral resources.

He emphasized on ensuring safety in the work place.

"Safety is extremely important. We need safety in the mines and the unions must be involved in issues of safety," he said.

The President also endorsed KCM's plans to support agricultural projects intended to shore up economic diversification and to create more jobs.

The airstrip at Kasompe in Chingola has certainly seen better days going by its ageing terminal, rugged runway and bushy surroundings. Apart from some airlines operating charter services into Kasompe, the airstrip has seen little activity in the recent past.

It was thus a rare and honourable moment on Monday 7 December when this tiny airstrip hosted VIP activity. Hordes of Chingola residents converged at Kasompe amongst a melange of vehicles lined up to attention at this old fashioned airfield.

The First Lady of the Republic of Zambia, Madam Esther Lungu, was the reason for the hive of activity at Kasompe airstrip. The terrace of the small airfield building and the apron on the airstrip could hardly contain the number of visitors.

Several government officials including provincial minister Mwenya Musenge, Chingola Mayor Titus Tembo, District Commissioner Mary Chibesa were also at Kasompe to receive the First Lady. Madam Lungu

was visiting to take a tour of some of the KCM CSR projects over the next two days.

During her visit to Chingola in October when she accompanied her husband His Excellency, Mr Edgar Chagwa Lungu, she had shown immense interest in the KCM CSR programme and committed to return to the town to see for herself.

Hence, as the large Zambia Air Force aircraft came to a halt, and Madam Lungu alighted from the cabin sporting a glamorous brown and beige chitenge outfit, her usual warm smile delighted the crowd. Many jostled to greet her but security was on hand to ensure an orderly welcome for the First Lady of Zambia.

Amid spontaneous jubilation, Mrs Lungu left the airport accompanied by district officials to meet KCM management led by the CEO Mr Steven Din who gave her a brief about KCM's CSR projects.

The briefing was followed by a stop at Ndeleni in Chiwempala, where KCM has established a community school and care centre for children. The centre was constructed at a cost of K600,000 and caters for 160 children in baby class and pre-school.

Children at this modern early learning centre, which also has a dining hall and six classrooms, got enlivened when the First Lady distributed early Christmas gifts and shook the hands of the little ones. She could not resist the parental care of embracing some children.

The First lady was impressed to learn that Ndeleni receives a K35,000 grant from KCM for routine operations and to provide three free meals to the children as their parents go about selling merchandise at Chiwempala market.

The next day, the First Lady headed to Shimulala, where KCM finances several livelihood projects. On her way to Shimulala, she commissioned the new Helen Bridge which was constructed by KCM at a cost of over ZMW 877,000. She also laid a foundation stone for the US\$2 million Nabona out-growers project seeking to empower local farmers.

At the end of the Shimulala tour, it was a moment to address hundreds of jubilant residents from the Shimulala, Helen and Kakosa settlements. Madam Lungu paid glowing tribute to KCM for empowering women with life-saving skills in cattle rearing, tailoring and farming.

"I want to urge the community to continue working closely with KCM because this is your trusted partner. From just some of the key projects I have seen, it is clear that KCM has spent \$160 million in the communities over the last 11 years," she said.

Shimulala is one of the areas where people have benefitted from nearly 600 cattle and 2,327 goats KCM has given to 26 community groups in three districts since 2011.

The First Lady's visit to Chingola reinforced KCM's commitment to its community partners.

KCM later hosted a dinner in her honour at Nchanga lodge. The guests at the dinner were not only treated to a mouth-watering dinner but also a barrage of jokes from an up and coming comedy duo, Kelvin and Peter. Spontaneous moments of roaring laughter for much of the evening was clearly a welcome gesture after a hard day's work touring the projects. The comedy wrapped up a very successful visit by the First Lady.

Delta-V Training Centre produces 18 operators

Eighteen employees have been trained at the recently launched Distribution Control System (DCS), commonly known as Delta-V Training Centre at the Nchanga Smelter.

The DCS is a simulation of processing facilities within the Nchanga smelter, which captures 99.6% sulphur dioxide, and ranks among the world's most environmentally-friendly processing plants.

The facility is the first point of internal training for new employees assigned to work at the Nchanga smelter. Training has been extended to employees at the Tailings Leach Plant to prepare them for

future rotation in their roles.

Smelting and Refining Business Unit Head, Enock Mponda, said when presenting certificates to the employees that the training had been successful due to their commitment. He said other employees would undergo the same training.

"I am very proud to present the certificates to the deserving employees who have successfully completed training in the DCS Delta-V training Centre," Mr Mponda said.

He said the facility would be open for trainees from other mines in Zambia and foreign nationals from other smelters.

Head of Instrumentation

Thikkal Veedu Mathusoothanan expressed satisfaction with the outcomes of the programme.

"This is a good initiative... we should look for more projects that are going to add value to our operations and in turn boost production," Mr Mathuoothanan said.

He said the programme had been initiated as part of KCM continuous switch from old to new technology.

One of the trainees, Matthews Shumba, an Instrumentation Engineer said the training would simplify his duties.

Nachilima Chomba, from the Acid Plant said she had acquired vital experience from the simulation plant.

Smart mining, production model cuts energy usage

Ex-Energy Manager Alaguvel Mookandi, in his farewell interview with Konkola News, before he returned home to India, said some measures had been taken to reduce power usage for KCM's power-intensive plants, which were designed at 85 percent electric energy usage.

Mr Mookandi said the company adopted efficient ways of using energy through a model dubbed "smart mining, smart production."

He said the energy management team has rolled out energy reduction initiatives to save 9MW of electricity.

"We believe that properly managed energy plans will result in financial savings for the company and also help to reduce the pressures on load shedding," he said.

One of the measures leading to the reduction of power consumption is the optimization in usage of winders at Konkola Mine. The Konkola ventilation team has cut the number of heavy compressors from 6 to 2 and operates one ventilation fan at any given time.

"Concentrators at Konkola and Nchanga mines are focusing on their mills operating hours reduction by maximizing the feed rate," Mr Mookandi said.

At Nchanga smelter, the team

has replaced an electrical heater at the oxygen plant with a steam powered heater using excess steam from the waste heat boilers.

The Konkola mine team has reduced the average number of pumps from 36 to 28 and retained the water pumping power

consumption at 54MW, despite an increase in the volume of the pumping period.

Mr Mookandi said the current initiatives and other long term plans would enable KCM to be more efficient in energy consumption.

Human vibration management key to safety

By Ruth Mulenga Konkola Copper Mines (KCM) shares with other mines the need for firms to implement world-class safety initiatives to keep the work force safe from abnormal vibration exposure.

In a recent presentation at the Health, Safety and Environmental conference in Lusaka, KCM Occupational Health expert Nchimunya Bbautu said vibration exposure in the mining industry was an old occupational hazard that requires proper attention to foster a Zero Harm culture in mining operations.

Mr Bbautu said under strict guidelines, firms are required to keep their workers within acceptable vibration exposure limits when they use power tools and other vibrating equipment.

He said KCM in May 2014 reinvested in vibration monitoring tools to enable occupational health experts to continuously monitor employees' exposure to vibration to ensure acceptable safety standards and good health.

"Human vibration is classified in two categories, Whole-Body Vibration (WBV), where the transmission is from an item through the feet or the buttocks and into the body. The other one is Hand-Arm Vibration (HAV) where the transmission is from the tool through the hand into the arm and then the body." Mr Bbautu explained.

Whole-body vibration exposure is associated with low back injuries and spinal disorders. Effects of Hand-arm vibration include loss of

feeling, numbness, and blanching or whitening of fingers known as "vibration white finger."

He said KCM is managing human vibration through exposure assessment and medical surveillance involving routine monitoring of exposure levels in identified or suspected job categories using an M3 Quest HAV Pro Monitor.

Mr Bbautu said using a continuous monitoring system such as the HAV Pro will not only

prevent employees from harm, but will also save businesses time and money caused by absenteeism.

Mining machinery and tools such as rock breakers, loaders, dump trucks, locomotives, jack hammers, long hole drilling machines, scrapper units, dump trucks, excavators, shovels, drill rigs, graders, folk lifts, locomotives and tractors expose humans to vibration.

Konkola Business Unit Vice President Keith Kapui has said there is a marked improvement in Konkola operations because of diligence among employees.

Speaking during the Vice President quarterly communication meetings and award giving ceremony held in Konkola, Mr Kapui urged employees to go an extra mile in ensuring that production is pushed up while managing costs, and maintaining high safety standards in the areas of operations.

Mr Kapui explained that it was important to produce more copper in a safe manner in order to mitigate the impact of the harsh operating conditions, which has been aggravated by declining metal prices and high electricity tariffs.

Konkola No. 3 Shaft improves production

Konkola No. 3 Shaft improved its performance by 93 percent in September after taking several measures aimed at enhancing production and productivity.

Management at KBU has come up with a 10-point strategy in order to tap the full mining potential of the unit.

Number 3 Shaft underground Manager Charles Litiya said a drift from conventional to mechanized mining has resulted in higher efficiency and effectiveness in productivity.

Mr Litiya said that with dump truck and loader availability currently at 57 percent and 65 percent respectively, tonnes moved per hour per machine have gone up while output previously achieved in three days was being done within a few hours.

"I'm delighted to say that improvement of productivity for both machines and men has been one important tool that we are using at No. 3 Shaft to pick up our production. There is nothing as good as having a motivated workforce," he noted.

Maintaining high levels of safety standards coupled with a committed work force were critical for the KCM turnaround, he said.

"Safety at No. 3 Shaft is a priority just like good production, the two cannot be separated and our emphasis has been to focus on pre-task risk assessments, planned task observation, inspections and visible felt leadership."

KCM recruits nurses to improve healthcare services

KCM has recruited more nurses to complement existing staff and improve the delivery of health care to employees, their families and communities around its mining areas.

Acting Manager for Medical Services Dr Edward Chilekwa says the recruitment of nurses has improved the nurse to patient ratio to 1 nurse to 6 patients. This situation will significantly improve both in and out-patient health service delivery and reduce stress among nurses.

Dr Chilekwa said, "Our aim is to provide an excellent health service to KCM employees, their family members and the public. The overarching goal is to ensure a healthy work force that supports higher production and the sustainability of KCM."

"KCM is effectively supplementing government efforts by providing healthcare services required to achieve national goals of having a healthy population," Dr Chilekwa added.

Dr Chilekwa disclosed that over 100 applicants had sought to be employed in the 35 positions of nursing jobs, which were all filled up by August.

Dr Chilekwa said the company was also in the process of recruiting two specialists, two general medical practitioners and a clinical pharmacist to boost staff numbers at Konkola and Nchanga South hospitals.

One of the new nurses, Esnart Chama said, "I am determined to make a positive contribution to

providing quality care. There is good support from my mentors in the department. The hospitals are well equipped and I am enjoying my work."

"We are so pleased to welcome the new nurses to our hospitals," said Nchanga South Hospital Chief Nursing Officer Loveness Kaniki.

KCM operates two hospitals – the Konkola mine hospital in

Chililabombwe and Nchanga South Hospital in Chingola. The company also runs eight clinics, three each in Chililabombwe and Chingola, one each in Kitwe and Nampundwe, respectively. These institutions provide medical care to more than 63,000 people, including employees and their family members who receive free healthcare.

KCM was able to save significant sums of money through the fabrication of the Amrody car, which was named

The Amrody car is mainly used by whistle men to provide signals underground.

after him.

In February 2015, Amrody expertly rehabilitated a 40 ton EJC dump box, a piece of equipment that hauls copper ore from production areas to draw points, within a record of 11 days.

In July, he refurbished a Normet in less than 30 days. The Normet low bed car is used to carry materials.

"I do all these things because of the passion I have for my job," Amrody said.

"I enjoy the work that I do... and it is important that we begin to move the company in the right direction," he said.

Amrody encouraged his colleagues in KCM not to relent in their efforts to help with the
